
Quagga Veligers Found in Deer Creek Reservoir

Starting immediately, those boating on Deer Creek Reservoir must decontaminate their boat before leaving the state park.

DNA tests at two laboratories indicate microscopic juvenile quagga mussels—called veligers—were found in a water sample taken at the reservoir.

Potential impacts

- The discovery does not mean Deer Creek Reservoir is infested with quagga mussels. Evidence of mussels in the past, at other waters, have proven to be false alarms. Examples include Red Fleet Reservoir, Electric Lake, and Sand Hollow Reservoir.
- Quagga mussels usually do not reproduce in water that's colder than 50 degrees. There's little risk of a possible mussel population expanding in the reservoir at this time. That could change, however, when the water warms this spring.
- The decontamination order will greatly reduce the chance that any quagga mussels in the reservoir are spread to other waters. Upon leaving Deer Creek State Park, boaters must:
- ✓ Clean and drain their boat, on their own, before leaving the park. After cleaning and draining, a DWR or Utah State Park technician will place a tag on the boat that indicates when it was cleaned and drained. The boat will not be allowed to launch at another body of water in Utah until the boat has dried long enough to kill any mussels that might be in or on it.
- ✓In the winter, boats must dry for at least 30 days. The drying time can be as little as three days, though, if the temperature the boat is drying in remains below 32 degrees Fahrenheit for at least 72 straight hours.
- ✓ Have their boat professionally decontaminated at the park. The service is free. A DWR or Utah State Parks technician will determine whether the boat needs to be professionally decontaminated.
- It's possible that this is an isolated incident. For example, it's possible that the veligers made their way to the reservoir in or on a boat that had been on a contaminated water. We'll know a lot more after we and our partners conduct further surveys this spring.

Next steps

- This spring, the Division of Wildlife Resources and its partners will take action to learn whether adult quagga mussels are present in the reservoir. That action includes:
 - · Collecting and analyzing water samples.
 - Sending divers into the reservoir, to search for mussels.
 - Placing substrate samplers in the water. Adult quaggas attach to these as they
 move through the water.
 - Surveying shorelines.
- Regarding the lower Provo River and Utah Lake, both of which are below Deer Creek Reservoir:
 - Quagga mussel sampling work has been underway at Utah Lake for years. Those efforts will continue this spring.
 - Sampling work will start this spring on the lower Provo River.
- Quagga mussels cannot travel upstream. The only way quaggas could make their way to the middle Provo River (the portion of the river above the reservoir) is if they were transported there on someone's boots or fishing equipment.

Background

- On Oct. 30, 2014, a Bureau of Reclamation (BOR) water quality sampling crew collected water samples throughout the reservoir. Those water samples were analyzed by a BOR lab. On Dec. 12, the lab reported that there appeared to be five quagga mussel veligers in a sample taken near the dam. The DWR requested that the samples be genetically analyzed to learn whether they were in fact quagga mussels. Through DNA testing, both the BOR lab and Pisces Molecular, a private third party, confirmed that the veligers were quagga mussels.
- It's impossible to tell exactly where the quagga mussels came from. All of the reservoirs on the lower Colorado River, including Lake Powell, have a rapidly growing population of quagga mussels. The veligers could easily have come from one of those waters on a boat. It's important for boaters to remember to completely clean and drain their boats before leaving a quagga-infested water such as Lake Powell, and then dry their boat for 30 days at home. If a boater cannot dry their boat the needed amount of time, they can request a professional, hot water decontamination from the DWR or Utah State Parks. - A veliger is a young quagga or zebra mussel that has not attached itself to a surface. They free float in the water column until they are mature enough to attach. Each adult quagga mussel can release (give birth) to up to 1 million veligers a year. Veligers do not have a high survival rate, however, with mortality often exceeding 99 percent. They are microscopic and can be identified only under a microscope in a laboratory. They are easily pulled into the ballast tanks, live wells, bilges and engines of boats. The five veligers that were found near the dam at Deer Creek Reservoir were likely brought there in or on a boat.

Utah State Parks Ice Safety Tips



UTAH STATE PARKS ICE SAFETY TIPS

Utah State Parks Boating Program Manager Ty Hunter reminds visitors to be careful when venturing out on the ice. With varying temperatures, ice conditions can change quickly. Hunter offers the following safety tips:

- Test the ice. Drill a hole close to shore to determine ice thickness. People should stay off the ice if it is two inches or less. Ice four inches thick will typically hold the weight of a person.
- Always carry ice picks and a life jacket. If you fall through, ice picks provide grip and traction allowing you to pull yourself out of the water. A lifejacket keeps you afloat if you can't self-rescue.
- Stay calm. If you do fall through the ice, remain calm and keep your head above water and control your breathing. Keep all clothing on to stay insulated. Swim towards the ice opening and use your ice picks to secure and pull yourself out.
- Reach, throw and don't go. If someone falls in, reach something to the victim like a ski pole or tree branch; throw a rope or extension cord; don't create a second victim.
- -Dress for weather conditions and layer your clothing
- -With the discovery of quagga veligers at Deer Creek, be sure to clean, drain, and dry your equipment. Equipment must be frozen for 3 days in a row, dry for 30 days, or professionally decontaminated.


