## ECONOMIC TOOLKIT INFO

- In 2009, 16,213 individuals visited Camp Floyd Stagecoach Inn.
- Current information about visitor spending and economic impacts is not available for Camp Floyd. As the park is located in Utah County, the state's 2nd largest county in terms of economic output, economic impact from the park is small. However, it is likely that the area's smaller rural communities such as Cedar Fort receive significant benefit from visitor spending.
- In 2009, the City of Fairfield received \$1,900 in sales and use taxes from park operations.
- Camp Floyd provides lectures, workshops, historical reenactments, and demonstrations. The park is a central to Utah's history, and serves the needs of many of the county's school children.
- Division staff are responsible for patrolling and maintaining a significant amount of area open to off-highway vehicles (OHVs) and snowmobiles in Utah County. In 2008, 31,357 OHVs and 4,479 snowmobiles were registered within Utah County. These yield revenues to the county (in the form of fees in-lieu of property taxes) of about \$862,318 for OHV registrations and \$123,173 for snowmobile registrations for a total of \$985,491.
- The Division's Boating Program collects data and information on boating-related activities and opportunities in each county. In 2009, Utah County had 18 boat dealers, 6 boat liveries (providing boat rentals) and 5 boating outfitters. Also in 2009, the Division's Boating Program authorized (or listed as current) 26 Captain/Guide licenses and boat crew permits within the county. The division plays a key role facilitating economic impacts to the county through the provision of boating opportunities.
- Camp Floyd Stagecoach Inn provides a number of essential, community-oriented services and frequently partnerships with the county in providing or sharing resources (PROVIDE EXAMPLES – back up for local law enforcement agencies, education programs to schools, wildland fire support, community event staff support, search and rescue availability, etc.).
