

Caring for the Park

Welcome to Wasatch Mountain State Park. As you begin your journey to becoming a Jr. Ranger please:

- Stay on the park trails and designated routes. Trails are built for your safety and to protect the park's natural resources.
 Off-trail travel can crush animals' burrows and plants. This often will cause problems with erosion for the animals.
- 2. Pack it in, Pack it out. Be sure to pack out everything you carry into the park. Put all trash in the nearest garbage can or recycling bin.
- 3. Take only pictures leave only footprints.

Historic Huber Grove


Take a 1-mile walk or drive up Snake Creek Road to the Huber Grove. Johannes and Maria Huber settled this area around 1873. They built the creamery in 1885 and planted apple trees in the 1890s. These apple trees are still producing apples.

As you walk the grounds read the signs to learn about how the Huber's survived raising 10 kids while living in a 1 bedroom house with no running water.
