SALT LAKE MERCUR RAIL LINE

In researching the Salt Lake Mercur rail line that ran from Fairfield through Manning Canyon to Mercur I have been coming across a lot of crazy news stories. This line was built to haul ore to the Manning processing mill at the mouth of Manning Canyon. During the rail line's history, because of the way the rail line was laid out there were many cars that came off the track and even rolled down the hill. This was because the rail grade was steep and had many curves to it. On June 10, 1900 The Salt Lake Herald Republican newspaper had an interesting account. The Campbell Brothers Circus was going to Mercur for a show and because the train cars were so long and heavy with the circus animals the train got stopped on the railroad section with the most curves and steepest sections. They had to unload the animals and walk them up the rail line and into Mercur for the scheduled show. Can you imagine growing up and living in Mercur and seeing elephants and camels being herded into town? The train had to be backed back to the Fairfield train station and wait until the circus animals finished the show and were walked back down the road to be loaded on the train to go to their next destination. The article mentions that there were many of the water tanks and coal chutes along the line that were destroyed as the train was traveling up Manning Canyon.
